## Project London Medical Placement


Year 12 student, Jia Ying Ku, was recently chosen as one of a select few to attend a Medical Projects placement in London where she spent time in a hospital simulation suite and benefited from the teachings of NHS doctors. The pre-medical course provided Ying with an authentic insight to the life of a doctor as well as allowed her to experience the role of a neurosurgeon within the hospital. It also gave her the foundation of medical knowledge and clinical skills which she used throughout the week in the simulation suite in Whittington Hospital by managing emergency scenarios. Throughout the course, Ying learnt numerous important skills, including how to analyse chest x-rays, perform mental state examinations and analyse the data from a psychiatrics' point of view, how to measure blood pressure using a sphygmomanometer, how to record medical and pain history and perform suturing, airway management, intubation, cannulation and how to advance life support by analysing the patient's ECG. Ying is congratulated on being selected for such a prestigious opportunity, which has certainly heightened her enthusiasm to study medicine and provided her with a valuable head start on a career in this field. ## Clontarf Academy

The Clontarf Academy students have been enjoying another action packed term. They have worked hard to finalise their Graduate Employment Plans, designed to prepare them for life after school. The students also participated in a number of engagement, reward and development activities, such as bubble soccer at Queens Park Oval. Three Year 12 students, Jermaine Bropho, Cedric Cuttabutt and Lockie Ronan, were selected to take part in the Woodside Cup, a program that recognises Clontarf's hardest working Year 12's from across WA. This event included honing their interview skills and participating in financial literacy sessions. It culminated in the students playing the Curtain Raiser before the Dockers versus North Melbourne game for the Woodside Cup. In week 5, the Yule Brook Academy joined Sevenoaks for a combined training session, followed by a bacon and egg breakfast. The event was attended by local Member Bill Johnston and a number of Clontarf Partners who enjoyed seeing the students in action. Rio Tinto also hosted their second year of the *Job Ready* program, which Anthony Eastley, Hayden Hodgkinson and Camryn Morgan from the Trade Training Centre automotive program participated in.



## EALD Excursion

At the end of the first term, Year 12 General EALD students enjoyed an educational excursion to Mundaring Weir. It focussed on preparing them for the compulsory Externally Set Task (EST) by covering almost all of the essential focus criteria such as the study of significant places, human impact, introduced species, primary industry and sites of cultural significance. Students learnt that gold was discovered in Coolgardie and Kalgoorlie in 1882, and that camels were introduced to transport water to the miners. Students also explored the history of the Helena River, an area of cultural significance to the local indigenous Bibbulmun people, which was later dammed (Mundaring Weir) and a pipeline built in 1903 to transport the water. The excursion proved to be an engaging way of covering EST content and was enjoyed by all.



## Guild Camp

The elected Year 11 and 12 student Guild members attended an action-packed two-day leadership camp at Ern Halliday in Hillarys late last term. Students enjoyed participating in a number of challenging, adrenaline-filled team-building activities, such as the flying fox and crate climbing. The camp also involved the more serious role of students learning how to improve their leadership skills and planning events and activities to coordinate throughout the remainder of 2018. This year, there was much singing by the group and even an entertaining evening of charades. The Guild members are congratulated on their enthusiastic and focussed participation during the camp and we look forward to seeing them fulfil their leadership goals in coming months.
